He now works in the UK and abroad on the system leadership and rapid improvement of public services

Chief Social Worker for Adults Department of Health

Lyn took up her post as Chief Social Worker for Adults in September 2013. Previously, Lyn worked as the Director for Adult Social Care and Joint Commissioning in the London Borough of Camden. She has also worked as an inspector with the Social Services Inspectorate, as well as working in Yorkshire for over 20 years as both a field social worker and in a variety of management roles across children and adults. She has recently returned from a career break during which she was full time carer for her mother.

Chief Social Worker for adults

The Chief Social Worker for Adults works collaboratively with the Chief Social Worker for Children and Families. Together they work from the Office of the Chief Social Worker to:

- support and challenge the profession to ensure that children and adults get the best possible help from social workers
- provide independent expert advice to ministers on social work reform, and the contribution of social work and social workers to policy implementation more generally
- provide leadership and work with key leaders in the profession and wider sector to drive forward the improvement and reform programme for social work
- challenge weak practice to achieve decisive improvements in the quality of social work
- provide leadership to the network of principal social workers

TIM PASSMORE

Police and Crime Commissioner for Suffolk and chair of the National Rural Crime Network

Tim Passmore has served as Suffolk's Police and Crime Commissioner since November 2012.

Tim comes from a farming background. Prior to taking up the post of PCC, he was a self-employed agricultural and rural business consultant and the Leader of Mid Suffolk <u>District Council. He is the Chair of the National Rural Crime Network.</u>

Tackling the crime of domestic abuse remains one of the top priorities for Suffolk's Police and Crime Commissioner and features prominently in his Police and Crime Plan 2022-25. Looking after and safeguarding individuals at risk of criminality and/or exploitation is crucial. These challenges in rural areas are exacerbated due to remoteness and isolation of rural communities. It is a major commitment of the National Rural Crime Network to continue lobbying government departments for a more equitable distribution of national resources for rural communities



TIM CHAMPION

County Line and Gang Consultant

Tim joined the Metropolitan Police in 1988. As a Detective Superintendent on the Trident and Area Crime Command he had responsibility for reducing gang crime in London leading activity against priority gangs and their associated drug supply. Tim blueprinted the current MPS (Metropolitan Police Service) Gang Operating Model.

Tim has worked proactively against drug networks for over 20 years at force and regional and level. He devised and led the MPS response to "County Lines", pioneering the use of the Modern Slavery Act to target organisers of county lines.

Tim retired from the MPS and in August 2018 undertook a new role under the National Police Chiefs Council, coordinating the national response to county lines and creating the National County Line Coordination Centre.

In July 2021 he left the coordination centre to work as a County Line and Gang consultant.

CEO, Rural Coffee Caravan

Ann has been part of the Rural Coffee Caravan (RCC) since 2004; building it from a single caravan doing around 20 visits a year, to an organisation with 4 vehicles, making over 200 visits a year.

We have also helped several other counties develop their versions of our core model.

Being connected is a vital part of staying safe and we believe that loneliness is everyone's business and have created webs of connection across community groups, hospitality outlets and community shops to enable us to reach and draw in the most isolated members of our rural communities.

Kevin has worked within the children's workforce in a number of roles for a significant number of years. He has been a front line practitioner and worked his way up through the ranks to become an operational manager and finally was a Head of Service for a local authority children's services department.
