Careers advice may not be tailored to the way they learn. Work experience opportunities can fail to materialise. And many are never given the chance to see what a real job looks like - or to understand how they can get there. Our Career Ready Fund will support organisations to put trained job coaches to work inside schools, alongside young people with learning disabilities from age 14.
